#### Prevent Training

Online Staff Prevent Awareness Training for Education

#### (new dates added)

These sessions cover all of the important issues that staff need to know for Prevent (What is Prevent?, What is radicalisation? Case study example, Common signs of vulnerability and radicalisation, Current threat level and the main risks from terrorism and extremism).

The session is suitable for all education sector organisations but is particularly useful for smaller organisations who may struggle to provide a more detailed Prevent input to smaller staff cohorts. You can use this training for new staff in all educationbased organisations or for those staff who need a more detailed insight or update.

## **Radicalisation Policy**

The Extremism and Radicalisation Policy for Schools has been updated and is always available on the Extremism and Prevent page of SchoolsNet.

Note: this policy is continually updated.

### **Internet Safety**

With young people being off school for the summer holidays, internet safety and awareness of online harm is more important than ever.

> Extremists use the internet and social media to spread their ideologies, hate, fake news, and conspiracy theories. They actively target, exploit, and groom children and young people. The more a stranger knows about your child, the easier it is to groom them and gain trust.

Frequently used tactics include memes, making alterations to photos, videos and documents and using them out of context. They make up quotes and social media posts for popular public figures, especially ones that young people look up to and follow online. Their aim is to encourage them to share misinformation and hate.

Extremists often pick a genuine local issue or concern and use it to spread lies, fear and hate about the group they're targeting.

### Where to start?

The most important thing parents and carers can do is talk to the children and young people in their lives about what they enjoy doing online. Talk about what they think isn't so good online and what they could do to make it better. Keep the conversation open as your child gets older and becomes more independent online. Create a plan with them for when things go wrong or make them uncomfortable. Consider having a "no blame rule" so they will talk to you if things go wrong. If they are worried about consequences at home, they make hide things that are happening online.

Educate Against Hate - Prevent Radicalisation and Extremism provides parents with the answers to common questions and with resources to help protect their child from being groomed by extremists. The site also has ideas for how to talk to children about hate and extremism and where to seek help.

<u>ACT Early | Prevent radicalisation</u> provides advice, support, case studies, tips on how to spot the signs of radicalisation, and ways to share concerns. There are also suggestions for talking to young people and tips for staying safe online.

Parenting, Media, and Everything in Between | Common Sense Media is another useful site that provides information about keeping young people safe on video games, Tik Tok, Discord, etc. It also shares ideas on how to protect children's identity and data online, hacking, privacy settings and more.
